Bathroom and Washroom Vocabulary

Bathrooms and washrooms are important places in our daily lives. That is where we start and end each day, getting cleaned up and ready for the next part of our routine.

What kinds of nuučaanuł words can we learn when cleaning up? Let's practice our hatinquwił and čiišuł vocabulary with these language activities. Activity #1: Hygiene Mini-Posters

It can be hard to remember the steps in our routine for getting clean, especially for kids who are learning to take care of themselves! Let's make mini-posters for the hatinquwil or čiišuł to remind a younger person about steps or rules for keeping clean.

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Activity #2: Washing-Up Song


Try to use as much nuučaanuł vocabulary as you can! Here are some words and phrases that can help you get started.
