Activity #2: How Do You Like to Catch Your Fish?

Nuuchahnulth has many different methods of catching fish, for example trolling, jigging, schoop netting, or drift netting. There are also different ways to travel to find the fish. For example, we can take a boat or use a canoe.

For each fishing method and mode of transport, write down everything you know about it and try to use as many nuučaanuł words or phrases as you can.

For example, you can share what fish you catch with each method, where to use each method, your own experiences, stories you have heard, teachings you have learned, advantages and disadvantages to each method, etc.
